Comments:	I would like to object to this planning application for the following reasons.  350 houses will potentially add 700 more vehicles to what is already a highly congested area at certain times of the day. The A227 Wrotham Road and surrounding roads are invariably grid locked at school times and rush hour.  The section of road from where Longfield Road joins the A227 towards the church is used as parking during school start and finish times, adding to the congestion and this development will increase that beyond doubt.  The parade of shops opposite this planned development already causes an accident black spot and with increased traffic this will only get worse.  The A227 and roads such as Green Lane and Longfield Road are used by heavy goods vehicles and when as there regularly is an incident on either the A2 or the M20 these roads are used as a cut through to get to the M25 and further afield adding to the traffic disruption.  This development would increase the population of Meopham by a considerable number of people which would put an additional strain on what is already an overstretched GP surgery and the wider NHS service.  Meopham is after all a village, and it does not have the infrastructure to support a

development of this size. The aforementioned surgery being one, another being the lack of school spaces, and public transport options. The trains are already overcrowded at peak times.

The site is a large piece of agricultural land which is used for food production this is something that is not going to be replaced once its gone its gone for good.
