Reasons for comment:

Comments:	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- Severe traffic impact: 350 new homes would generate 700+ additional vehicles plus service traffic, worsening congestion on the already overburdened A227 and narrow Green Lane.- Existing congestion: The A227 is frequently gridlocked, especially during school drop-off and pick-up times due to nearby schools and shops. Parking is already inadequate and often impossible to get parked at the local shops already. I am elderly and disabled and rely on the local shops.- Road safety and pollution: Additional access roads onto the A227 would increase delays, noise, and air pollution. Widening Green Lane and installing a roundabout would damage its rural character and create further traffic chaos.- Green Belt harm: The site lies within the Green Belt and should be protected to preserve openness and prevent urban sprawl. This scale of development is inappropriate for Meopham, which is a village.- Pressure on infrastructure: Local schools, GP surgeries, hospitals (including Darent Valley Hospital), public
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transport, drainage, and statutory services are already overstretched and would be further burdened.

- Poor pedestrian and cycle access:

Limited pavements and no cycle lanes make safe walking and cycling difficult.

- Impact on conservation areas:

The development would harm the setting, character, and ecological value of neighbouring conservation areas.

- Loss of high-quality agricultural land:

The site is productive farmland that has been actively farmed for centuries and would be permanently lost.

- Reduced local food production:

Development would significantly reduce local and national food-producing capacity.

- Environmental and biodiversity damage:

Loss of wildlife habitats, flora, and fauna would negatively affect biodiversity.

- Loss of village character:

The proposal would urbanise Meopham and contribute to overdevelopment of the Green Belt, despite more suitable sites being available elsewhere.
