Reasons for comment:

Comments: I object to Planning Ref. 20251116 for the proposed development west of Norwood Lane. The road network in this part of Meopham is already under significant strain, with many drivers using the A227 as a cut-through during delays on nearby major routes. When incidents occur, the area becomes gridlocked, and the narrow lanes are simply not designed to accommodate heavy traffic or large service vehicles. The addition of 150 more homes, together with hundreds of extra car journeys and deliveries, would intensify these problems and present serious safety concerns.

Local transport provision is already inadequate, with limited bus services and rail commuters regularly facing overcrowding on peak-time trains from Meopham and Sole Street stations. An increase in population of this scale would place yet more pressure on already overstretched GP practices and NHS services, leaving essential community infrastructure unable to cope. The loss of productive farmland is also a significant concern. This land has historically contributed to food production, and reducing local farmland makes communities more dependent on imports, which in turn increases the carbon footprint associated with transporting food long distances.

The environmental impact of the proposed development cannot be ignored. The surrounding area provides habitat for a variety of species typical of mixed farmland and hedgerow ecosystems. According to Natural England, UK hedgerows support over 1,500 species of insects, 600 species of wild plants, and

around 130 species of birds, making them one of the most important biodiversity assets in the countryside. Removing or fragmenting these habitats would cause a measurable decline in local biodiversity and further degrade the ecological quality of the area.
